# EMPOWERING OUR FAMILIES AND COMMUNITIES AGAINST SEXUAL ABUSE



- Promote an open door policy during the day. Encourage your child or teen to spend time outside of their room, but respect thier need for privacy or rest, too.
- ◆ Lead by example. Teach the value of consent and the importance of respecting when someone says "no" or "stop."
- Be a family with no "secrets" and teach that surprises are kept a short time and are fun.
- Be supportive and let your child know that abuse is never their fault.
- Be vigilant. Let your children know to be wary of and tell you if
  - Someone offers them a gift for no reason.
  - Someone touches, hugs, talks about private parts, or makes them feel uncomfortable.
  - Someone asks your child to go somewhere without first asking for your permission.
  - Someone scares or bribes them into doing something against body safety rules.
  - Someone seems quick or eager to become friendly or close to your children (or to you).

## SCHOOL, SPORTS, AND OTHER ACTIVITIES

- It is very likely that there are adults or older children with whom your child will interact frequently. Listen when your child talks about them, and ask open-ended questions to gain a sense of your child's comfort level with others.
- Inquire about employee and volunteer screening and abuseprevention training for staff coaching or facilitating activities.
- To help minimize opportunities for abuse, avoid activities in which your child may be alone with an adult or older juvenile.
- Take time to introduce yourself and know the parents/ caregivers of your children's friends.
- Share family rules with others, such as teaching personal boundaries, the right to say no, and not having secrets.
- Ensure your child knows and feels comfortable to talk to you if
  - There seems to be a "favorite" student or teammate.
  - An adult is engaging in private communication via email/text/social media with students or teammates.

### FAMILY EMPOWERMENT

#### INTERNET AND SOCIAL MEDIA

- Keep computers/laptops, smart phones, tablets, and other electronics in common areas and out of bedrooms.
- Monitor cell phone and texting, and periodically review your child's browsing history.
- Discuss the dangers of communicating online, sharing photos, and sharing personal information.
- Keep in mind that Facebook, Twitter, Instagram, and even Pinterest are not free of pornography and that they present an opportunity for exploitation and trafficking.

#### ROCK THE TALK

- Engage in open, loving communication, and provide factual information about your children's bodies, their personal rights, and body safety rules.
- Encourage your children to talk with you if someone tricks or threatens them into doing something that makes them uncomfortable.
- Never threaten to hurt someone who may pose a risk to your child, since it may keep your child from disclosing or talking to you.
- Do not assume that your child knows what constitutes appropriate sexual behavior. Discuss respect, consent, ageappropriate sexual conduct, and promote positive healthy relationships.
