

PREVENTION EDUCATION

Freedom House provides violence prevention education programming in Bureau, Henry, Marshall, Putnam and Stark counties.

Freedom House preventionists help schools and learning communities create a safe, supportive, and secured environment by meeting state-mandated educational programs through age-appropriate, evidence-based, and comprehensive curricula for pre-school to college-age students.

Educational offerings include child sexual abuse prevention, social and emotional learning, bullying prevention, healthy relationships, general violence prevention, and safety. Trainings are available for school administrators, PTOs, school groups or clubs, and community groups.

SOCIAL - EMOTIONAL LEARNING AND BULLYING PREVENTION

The Freedom House Social - Emotional Learning program focuses on teaching respect and empathy, emotion management, communication, problem solving, peaceful conflict resolution, and bullying prevention.

HEALTHY RELATIONSHIPS AND TEEN DATING VIOLENCE

Studies show 1 in 3 teens have been, are, or will be in an abusive relationship by the time they are 18 years old.

Freedom House's Healthy Relationships and Teen Dating Violence programming focuses on communication, emotional management, healthy relationships versus unhealthy relationships, self-development, dating abuse, safety planning, defining caring relationships, and managing emotions.

Programming is available for grades 6-12, college students, and adults. Programming is available for individual classrooms or can be facilitated in a small group setting on a weekly basis.
